Overview of Beverley Town Council

2013/14 was another busy and successful year for the Town Council.

Our emphasis on promoting local food continued apace with a second food festival [Christmas Food and Drink] consolidating its position in the calendar along with other initiatives linked to the community allotment. Provision has been made in the budget to enable the work begun by the From Field to Table Project to be sustainable with the proviso that grants and sponsorship be sought for all food events and initiatives for the following year. This will allow us to build on the work begun by the Town Clerk and Local Food Co-ordinator.

I was delighted to be able to welcome a contingent of councillors from our French twin-town of Nogent-sur-Oise to the October Food Festival [our 8th] and am grateful to the twinning association for their sterling support in making the visit such a success. Any suggestion that I allowed the Vice-Mayor of Nogent to win the cook-off should be hotly disputed! The festival grows in popularity and this year was no exception, attracting thousands of visitors from throughout the region. Credit must be given to our officers who had to battle with a seemingly ever-changing layout of stalls due to the refurbishment of Saturday Market.

Our twinning steadily grows stronger and Cllrs Pinder and Astell accompanied me to Nogent for their Bal de la Soupe in the Autumn. French hospitality was as warm as ever and friendships from visits to Beverley rekindled.

As I write the Council is also preparing to send a delegation to attend the 35th anniversary of our twinning with Lemgo where we will promote Beverley as a tourist destination known for local food producers. We have also received a delegation of students from Japan where we have a link maintained by Cllr Whitfield.

Another high point of the year was the success of our dedicated 'Beverley-in-Bloom' volunteers whose hard work and vision were rewarded once more with a silver gilt award. I was also delighted to attend the opening event for the refurbished Memorial Hall, having acted with Cllr Pinder as one of the Town Council observers on the Trustees. [See a separate report in this booklet]

But the Town Council is not just about festivals and fun. During my tenure as Chair I have continued to work on bringing a number of our policies and procedures up to date and to implement a number of much-needed policies to ensure the smooth running of the Council's business and the service we offer. For example, our new allotments policy has ensured the quick turn-around of vacant plots to address the long waiting list which now rarely rises above single figures.

Sometimes the role of Chair of Council and Mayor is to ask difficult questions and to fight the corner of Beverley. The recent Town Meeting showed that people care intensely about the town and the detail of how its future will pan out. At times this has been a frustrating role to play, with our government grant being withheld by ERYC because we tried [and failed] to expand our range of services last year. This meant we returned the tractor with plough and gritter which we had leased as it was felt that we could not justify the expense. In our attempt to develop a balanced budget we made tough decisions. We have sadly reduced the time spent on youth provision and we continue to spend a large number of hours on administration of very little, something we will need to seriously consider.

As much as the floral décor of the town and the food festivals are an integral part of what we do there are other issues to consider.

On reflection I think we as a Council may be judged to be a rather unimaginative lot with a limited vision! It would be very easy as we go into the final year of this electoral term to tread water and not set any forward looking agenda for the next group of councillors. It is very easy to criticise the local authority but in my opinion we need to have a clear vision ourselves and to become better at consulting locally to canvas views. We should continue with our pattern of brainstorming of ideas and issues. A good place to start would also be the Town Meeting and continuing to reflect on the issues raised there by our residents.

My thanks go to all the Beverley Town councillors for their engagement with this important level of local government. As the elected custodians of this beautiful town, what will be our legacy after 4 years in office? It is important [and not just because the election nears] that we develop a clear vision and continue to influence the key decisions taken about our town.



Policy and Finance Committee

The Policy committee is the main body operating below and supporting Full Council. We are responsible for developing and implementing council policies as well as ensuring these are kept up to date to ensure we are following good practice as a public body. We also have responsibility for day to day finances as well as decisions on more significant expenditure and are tasked with formulating the annual budget for approval by the Council which sets our precept and anticipated expenditure for the upcoming year.

This year has again been a busy one as we once again brought our standing orders up to date and agreed a review of all our employment policies with the assistance of ACAS. We also revised our scheme of delegation to achieve more efficient committee working which merged Property and Services with Planning into a new Planning, Property and Services committee.

Beverley Town Council is one of the few of the larger town councils in the region that does not own or operate a building with associated facilities for its residents. This year we looked very closely at the possibility of acquiring the Samman Road Day Centre which was put up for sale by East Riding Council, but unfortunately it proved difficult to put together a detailed business plan and we could not reach agreement on this. This was definitely a lost opportunity, but Council was able to make a commitment to looking favourably on acquiring such a facility should a similar opportunity arise.

Together with the Planning, Property and Services Committee we had been looking at improving the condition of and facilities at the Multi-Purpose Games Area on the Swinemoor estate, but an approach by East Riding Council to relinquish the site to enable the building of extra-care sheltered housing caused us to rethink. We agreed this was a good use of the site in exchange for an agreement that a new facility to replace the MUGA be provided by ERYC on an alternative site equally accessible to the current users.

One of our long-standing projects has been the provision of WiFi in the town centre, but we have been frustrated by constantly shifting costings for this. However, after a meeting at a senior level with Kingston Communications, we were delighted to be offered the installation of the service free of charge. This will encourage people not only to visit the centre of town but also stay which will have significant benefits for local businesses. The system went live in June this year. We are extremely grateful to Kingston Communications for their generosity in this partnership working with the Town Council.

Again, working with Planning, Property and Services, we agreed the acquisition of a new allotment site at Keldgate/Lairgate and were able to recommend a rental holiday for our existing allotment holders from November to April to bring the rental agreements for all our sites into line. We also approved funding for a building on Plot 1 Queensgate to accommodate the Allotment Association shop which was facing closure due to increasing costs at their existing location. This should be in place and open for business by the autumn of this year.

We were extremely disappointed that East Riding Council did not pass on the central government grant moneys to the Council this year on the basis that we had increased our precept for 2012/13. This increase was due to our making preparations for acquiring additional services. However, as we were unable to negotiate these successfully, this year we were able to reduce our budget and our precept, even with the withholding of the anticipated grant moneys.

It has been a very interesting year as the Planning & Environment Committee has merged with the Property & Services Committee at the end of 2013. It has meant some of us having to learn what the functions of the Property & Services Committee. It has certainly made life interesting.



On behalf of the Committee I would like to thank the Allotment Representatives who have throughout the year continued to support the Committee.

Whilst we have diligently scrutinized all the smaller planning applications we have also been busy looking at larger applications.

As well as planning applications from householders for anything from extensions to dormer windows to conservatories, we have also had applications in from businesses for change of use – the most recent was change of use from a public house to a Veterinary Practice.

The committee's views are also sought on tree applications, on which the Town Council has been consulted by the Local Environment Planning Authority. Some of these we have approved but on several occasions we have objected to the trees being felled and our views have been taken into consideration. We are also informed of planned road closures

One of the larger planning applications that we have been consulted on has been the building of a 40 2-bedroom building for use as extra care sheltered housing on the Queens Road Recreation Ground.

We have also had presentations on the emerging East Riding Local Plan and the effect that it will have on Beverley and the surrounding area especially in that area south of Beverley near the Southern Relief Road.

The Committee have also been consulted on a number of occasions regarding the Market Place development and especially the setts.

We have been consulted on the Dogger Bank /Creyke Beck and received a presentation from them regarding the Statement of Common Ground. The Council were asked to sign this but were not happy with one of the clauses as they felt that the building would be a blot on the landscape.

The Committee also reviewed the Council's Community Emergency Plan, which in view of recent weather conditions, we felt it ought to be brought up to date.

I would like all my fellow members of the Committee for all their input in the meetings. My thanks also go to the Town Clerk, Administration Assistant and the Handyman for their support throughout the year in facilitating the services required. Last but not least I would like to thank Carol Oliver for all her help and effort that she puts into preparing for the meetings and for all the advice that she has given me during the year.

This year has also seen the committee liaising closely with the skate park users and East Riding of Yorkshire Council detached youth workers to ensure the park continues to be fit for purpose and supporting all efforts to improve the site, its fencing and signage.

I welcome the allotment holders on Keldgate and Lairgate.

Finally my thanks to my fellow committee members and to our Town Clerk; Assistant Clerk, Administrative Assistant and Handyman for their support throughout this year in facilitating the services required managing and maintaining this committee.

Grants Committee

The Grants committee met on two occasions, June 25th 2013 and February 3rd 2014.

Due to financial considerations, the 2013-14 budget for Grants was set at £20,000. In line with Council policy to prioritise support for charities working with the less privileged members of the community, it was decided to use £5000 of this to the benefit of the Cherry Tree Centre under a new Service Level Agreement (SLA).

As ever, the committee was impressed by the efforts and energies of all the local groups who applied for grants this year. It shows how active and socially minded the community of Beverley is.

The projects cover a wide range of cultural activities with music and performance featuring strongly. Beverley Arts Trust received funding for the Beverley Puppet Festival, as did two music festivals, one devoted to the Blues and the other to Bach.

The award to Beverley Open Doors Community Project was towards the 'Battle of the Bands' event, featuring local talent and of special interest to the younger members of the community. The interests of young people were also reflected in awards to the two local Scout groups.

Sport was represented in the grants to Sport for Everyone and to Hull Thursday Road club for the cycle race they organise through Beverley, which both encourages participation in the sport and brings many people into the town.

Visual art features in the awards this year with East Yorkshire artists receiving funding to support an outdoor art and craft festival to be held in the Georgian Quarter.

Annual report for the 'From Field to Table' project

As the funding from the Big National Lottery Changing Spaces Local Food programme came to an end on 31st March 2014, the emphasis of the project was placed on making activities sustainable, to take the very best elements of the projects forward, for the benefit of the town and its residents.

Many different groups and individuals played a part in making the Beverley Town Council 'From Field to Table' project a great success, including:

- Local food producers, growers and suppliers
- Chefs
- Volunteers who have given their time and energy to establish and develop our 'community training allotment plot' on Sparkmill
- Beverley Minster
- Rotarians from Hull Paragon
- Allotment Champions
- The Beverley Folk Festival
- Beverley Real Ale Festival
- Photographers
- Members of the press
- And of course, staff and Councillors from Beverley Town Council

A celebration event was held at Beverley Tickton Grange to highlight all that has been achieved through the project and to say a big 'THANK YOU' to everyone involved.

In summary:

'From Field to Table' began in April 2012 when it was awarded £119,083.98 from the National Big Lottery Fund's Changing Spaces Local Food programme, with the remit of: 'celebrating local food, its growers and producers and making local food affordable and accessible to everyone'.

Beverley Town Council also gave £11,500 in matched funding to support the project, and many thousands of pounds have been given to the project as 'in kind' benefits from volunteers.

Between April 2012 and March 2014 the project has created, organised and hosted 4 seasonal events on a yearly basis:

- The National Garden Scheme (NGS) Open Allotments Day in July – held at Kitchen Lane and Queensgate allotments

- The Beverley Food Festival in October
- The Christmas Festival of Food & Drink in November
- And a Spring Event, which took the form of the Mayor's Civic Dinner – a celebration of Local Food in 2013 – and a celebration event for 2014.

These events have helped to raise awareness of the importance of growing, cooking, and eating local produce. In turn, they have helped to support and promote local businesses involved in the production and sale of local food & drink.

We are very fortunate in the East Riding of Yorkshire to have so many local food businesses and a wealth of variety in local food and drink.

At our Beverley Food Festival, demand for stalls is now so high that we have a waiting list of companies and we have increased the number of stalls from 35 in 2006 to 100 in 2013. Our Christmas Festival of Food and Drink held in side Beverley Minster has doubled the number of stalls and we expect 60 stall for 2014.

In addition, the project has a Community Training Allotment plot situated on Sparkmill Lane in Beverley. This plot was given by the Town Council, to help train people to grow their own fruit and veg.

The plot was very overgrown at the start and had to be cleared, but with the help of the Local Food Big Lottery funding, we have been able to create a plot which will offer a great training facility for many years to come.

Many volunteers have come forward to assist us in creating this plot, and we are delighted to now be able to offer the plot to community groups such as FIND2 and Millers Day Centre in Beverley, which offer learning opportunities for young people and adults with learning difficulties.

Through educational awareness activities, local primary schools have received support from the project, to help to teach children all about growing and cooking their own food.

Press and promotion has been a key feature in delivering our project remit and we are grateful to receive such great coverage from local and regional press, TV and radio.

Here are just a few accolades that the project and its events have received:

- It's been given a Level 3 'Developing' Award from Yorkshire in Bloom in the Its Your Neighbourhood category for its community training allotment plot
- The Beverley Food Festival has been a finalist in the Remarkable East Yorkshire Tourism Awards (REYTAs) in the 'Sustainable Tourism' and 'Tourism Event' for 2 years running
- And the Christmas Festival of Food 2013 was nominated as a Finalist in the REYTAs 'Sustainable Tourism' category also
- The Beverley Food Festival 2013 was awarded the 'Best Local Food & Drink Event' in the region by the East Yorkshire Local Food Network

Over the lifetime of the project, the From Field to Table project has:

Helped 1480 individual beneficiaries

Created thousands of hours of employment

Benefitted 17 different organisations – including the Beverley Real Ale Festival, Beverley Minster, Beverley Folk Festival, Mires Beck Nursery

As the Big Lottery Local Food grant funding comes to a close, we are pleased to announce that Beverley Town Council is looking to sustain certain aspects of the project. With over £10,000 raised in income through events and fundraising activities, and the possibility of securing additional grant funding, we will be looking to continue and build on all the good work achieved already.

We ask that valued project supporters continue to get involved in the work we are trying to do, and together we can create something that showcases the town of Beverley, its local producers and growers to benefit residents and visitors from across the region and throughout the UK.

Chris Upton has striven to keep everyone informed and up to date on developments and in anticipation of our summer planting, can I thank her for her personal efforts to keep me aware and everyone on their toes for our busiest time of the year in May and June.

This last year we chose to put less emphasis on our participation in Yorkshire in Bloom and to re-create our public open competition. Matt Snowden has substantially produced a new framework for the town's involvement in what I hope, will be a popular and well subscribed event. A prime area for improvement last year was the Railway station. The operating network has recognised the effort lead by Peter Tomkys, to upgrade this important entry to Beverley and has adopted Beverley in Bloom as an official partner in its operation.

This coming year of commemoration of the Great War will be reflected in a simple red, white and blue colour scheme which we want to sweep through the town centre and make a traditional patriotic statement and background for the many events taking place this summer.

There will be a Beverley in Bloom social evening in July at the Tiger and our Certificate presentation in September will publically round off the year at St Mary's Church Hall. All are welcome to attend.

Beverley Renaissance Partnership

The Beverley Renaissance Partnership consists of a management committee on which I represent the Town Council and three action groups: Beverley Town improvement group, Beverley Business Group and Beverley Events and Festivals Group. Please see below a brief overview of our current projects:

Beverley Partnership Action Groups

The purpose of the Action Groups is to develop and drive solutions to address some of the recommendations outlined within the Draft Beverley Town Plan, with an overarching aim to develop initiatives that will help to strengthen Beverley's economy and visitor experience.

This year saw the restoration work on the Memorial Hall completed. Important infrastructure had been addressed, including securing the roof which had been subject to leaks as well as upgrading the mechanical and electrical installations. Internally the dressing rooms and toilet facilities were also improved while the auditorium was significantly restored and enhanced with new decoration including attractive wall-lighting and a very fine chandelier. Automatic doors and much improved disable access are new key features. Attention has also been given to the look of the front of the building with a new design within the windows and lighting which have all given a fresh look and reminded passers-by that the Hall is restored and ready for business. Windows have been replaced. The Hall is now fully open for bookings and the response to the improvements has been very positive.

A Grand Reopening Celebration was held in March including an open day for the public and speeches, a performance by Beverley Musical Theatre with a buffet in the evening.

The Mayor, Councillor Martin Cox, who serves with Councillor Margaret Pinder as the Town Council's observers on the Hall's committee of trustees, held his Civic Dinner there in order to showcase the venue. 130 guests attended an event that promoted local food (the upgraded kitchen proving vital here) cooked by a team from the Beverley Arms Hotel. Entertainment was provided by the Melodies, the Andrini Sisters and a duo showcasing contemporary dance.

The Trustees are now focussing on expanding the range of activities held there and developing a mix of regular events and one-offs. It is becoming increasingly popular as a wedding reception venue. We would encourage you to go to an event there and enjoy the much improved facilities.

Association of Charter Trustee Towns

Meetings were held in Bath, Grantham and Beverley, and I attended all three as the Chairman of the Association.

Delegates from, Bath, Beverley, Cleethorpes, High Wycombe, Kidderminster and Grantham have attended meetings this year. Beverley Town Council hosted the meeting in September and was delighted to be able to welcome our guests in the Beverley Arms hotel as the Guildhall was unavailable for the meeting. However, with the current economic difficulties we decided in future to only meet twice a year as our members cover a wide area.

The meeting held in Salisbury in June 2011 proved to be most enlightening as the Mayor & Town Clerk shared their information with us about how they were working in co-operation with the new Wiltshire Unitary Authority. I have approached government office suggesting they encourage councils to follow this good practice to co-operate with larger town/city parishes. However, government office always point to legislation for local determination!

Salisbury received assets, which have revenue implications e.g. Crematorium & Cemeteries, Allotments, Markets & Fairs and The Guildhall. The Guildhall came with £1million for its refurbishment from the former District Council as set up money from the Wiltshire Council. We were given a tour of the building after lunch and although a civic building revenue is generated from the hiring out of rooms for exhibitions and functions. Other devolved services passed to them which have real impact for the benefit of the residents.

It is 13 years since Beverley Town Council was created and the East Riding of Yorkshire Council has been reluctant to transfer any type of asset to the Town Council. This was an impression almost universally confirmed in a NALC survey April 2009. In the 1974 reform of Local Government all municipal property passed to new districts without payment to anyone. When a Unitary Authority is asked that property be returned to a new Town Council, the taxpayers have to pay again to get their property back. Government always expects this to be determined locally, which shows lack of understanding of the issues

The Localism Bill is now on the Statute Books but although it has been debated at length we still await guidelines of how it will benefit the Town/Parish Councils, who are the only elected accountable local bodies representing local communities.

Beverley has a strong part to play in the Association as one of the initial towns to gain a Town Council as local government changes to Unitary we need to strengthen the role of the lower and only tier that is close to local people.
